What's To Come?

Good question! Who knows? Nobody knows. What we do know is that there are some things that will no longer happen at our golf club for the foreseeable future. All state, district and club events have been cancelled until further notice. That means for example that Parklands will not host the 2020 Victorian Veterans Sandgreen Championship. There will be no pennant golf, no Cathy Winnell Day, no committee meetings, no working bees and at the time of publication, no golf of any description. In the months ahead the Parklands executive will need to consider a number of issues, how these issues are canvassed within our committee and membership structures, and how we negotiate a future full of uncertainty. As an organisation operating under the auspices of Golf Australia it is important for us to act in accordance with their recommendations. Here is their most recent advice:

2 April 2020

Many golf clubs around Australia have either re-opened, or are considering doing so, after recent state and territory-specific rulings or directives.

Golf Australia, while not wishing to act in a manner contrary to those specific rulings or directives, remains of the view that golf is a non-essential activity, a view which sits comfortably with the current Federal Government directive and rules to "stay at home" unless absolutely necessary.

Of course, Golf Australia is merely recommending that position to all clubs around Australia and ultimately we respect the right of the clubs to act in the way they see fit while complying with all social distancing requirements.

Golf Australia has adopted - and will continue to adopt - a prudent position of respecting and heeding Government advice on all matters pertaining to the COVID-19 pandemic.

The recommendation we formulated around course closure was based on the position Prime Minister Scott Morrison has taken and, at all times throughout this issue, Golf Australia has sought to provide the latest Federal and state advice for all golf clubs around the country.

That has proved an extremely difficult task given that various state positions have been constantly changing, almost on a daily basis. We apologise for any confusion that has caused, but we are sure you can understand these are unprecedented times in our country and, indeed, for our great game.

That so many people are passionate about the sport is a great sign of the game's significance in our community and we are truly sympathetic to those who are desperate to once again walk the fairways, but we as the national governing body feel that in this time of crisis for so many in our community, it is best to be safe.

Furthermore, we strongly believe that unity, prudence and safety during this unprecedented crisis is the best way for us to assist with "flattening the curve" of COVID-19's surge through the community and we believe that golf and our industry has a role to play in doing this.

Our recommendation to remain closed therefore remains the same - Australia and our community come first.

We yearn to see full fairways and clubhouses, but not as much as we desire our population to be fully healthy once again. As always, Golf Australia remains on hand to offer clubs advice and support through these troubling times, regardless of whether or not they've chosen to open or close.

We will endeavour to provide constant and relevant updates as soon as possible in this ever-changing landscape. Above all, please stay safe.

EDITOR'S NOTE: Please understand that this edition of Teeing Off and Out Of The Rough were compiled during a period when the goalposts were moving by the minute! It's instructive to read the following whilst understanding that nothing is certain!

Thanks to our golfers who have been fronting up to play the game each week. One

thing that is important that is beginning to miss THE MARK is the bringing of the correct entry money. Not a big factor you may say but in the current environment it is very important, if everyone brings notes that need changing, that is trouble for the 'cashier' and we have trouble. Not everyone is causing cash problems, but remember how you can make our club a happier club. See what happens next week? Volunteer workers trip away is early in preparations and your ideas are wanted for discussion. Already some golf clubs have been mentioned and are on the list pinned up at the clubhouse. Consideration must be given to a club that is able to provide lunch/close to an eating place. Halls Gap is one venue that has been mentioned but it would mean breaking our golf with a visit to the hotel for a bite. It is not a flash club house where we could sit around (in fact a poor club house) but a club which is an hour away from Parklands and presents some attractive greens with a mixture of wildlife across their course. The hotel is a 2km drive approximately, they also have an excellent ice-cream shop which most of us are unable to give a miss as we go through the 'village'. Very picturesque place is Halls Gap!

Speaking of volunteers, we now have a very good attendance each week to help do the jobs that are to be readied for the next game of golf. Several larger works are underway and the co- operation of all players is required for these jobs to be completed. Works at the back of the 16th sandscrape is currently under preparation to assist with the water flow which washes over the scrape and leaves our scrape in places, bare of sand. The third hole is also a part of this planning. There are drop zones indicating your next move, if you have hit into the works you MUST take your ball to the drop zone. Your understanding of the works being undertaken is expected, and you will still enjoy your golf! Various works will be carried out across the golf course and will require your understanding!

Surprise golf is a good game and we certainly got a surprise when the executive had us playing a 'four stick' stableford game when most of turned up to play the game presented in our fixture book. Apparently, it could happen again so be wary of changes over the next weeks!

As I have written beforehand the weather has been different this season and we are not able to forecast the weather we are going to get. Day by day weather forecasts are probably the way to go. Do we need our umbrella (usually fixed in our gear) sun cream or a wind cheater, do we wear shorts, or do we have our wet weather clothing handy? It is certainly a gamble with what we can prepare for, but most of us just go out and have a hit and count it as another practice round and don't worry about the weather! Or not too much, anyway?

Rules Of Golf that should be introduced to golf.

Rule 9k. 34 – If a tree is between the ball and the hole, and the tree is deemed to be younger than the player, then the ball can be moved without penalty. This is because this is simply a question of timing; when the player was younger, the tree was not there so the player is being penalised because of his age.

Rule 1. a5 – A sliced ball or hooked into the Rough shall be lifted and placed on the Fairway at a point equal in distance it carried or rolled into the Rough with no penalty. The senior player should not be penalised for tall grass which ground keepers failed to mow.

Rule 2.d. 6. – A ball hitting a tree shall be deemed NOT to have hit the tree. This is simply bad luck and luck has no place in a scientific game. The senior player must estimate the distance the ball would have travelled had it not hit the tree, and play the ball from there.

Football tipping is under way but we have not got a tipping contest except for the one run by the Spectator. If you have registered with the Spectator, we are hoping the tipping can be then organised to side step it into our tipping contest. We must wait and see how it is going to work! I hope the ladies have entered the competition as it makes for an interesting contest.

With the Coronavirus, the club has had to change several areas of playing the game. I suspect Secretary Bruce will alert you to, no need to hear it from me as well. Just get out and enjoy some exercise whilst this is going on

and take the warnings seriously and we will all come through it safely. Don't travel to anywhere and keep your home within easy reach. The AFL players and staff are going to find the next month very tough to handle (not just their bank accounts) so heed the warnings put out for us all.

Veterans golf is not going ahead either. So, no need for us worry about that, as we will be notified when the all clear is given. Also, the Pennant rounds are not going ahead as I am assured it won't worry to many of our players.

Congratulations to our member James Brown on being crowned the club champion at the Hamilton Golf Club. Well done Brownie, and you kept the lead throughout the duration of the event. A very special win and your Parkland members send their best "good win mate". Committee News





Around The Grounds



He's A Parklander!

It wasn't long before James' talent became evident and in his early teens was taken in by the South West Sports Academy based in Warrnambool. It was here that the raw talent was refined. In 2013 he was runner-up in the Victorian Sandgreen Championships at Beechworth. Two years later he took the title of Victorian Sandgreen Champion at Quarry Hill. James has won the Parklands championship multiple times and in taking out this year's Hamilton Golf Club Men's Championship has become the first player to have won championships at both clubs. Sand or grass; doesn't matter! A champion is a champion. Through all this James has kept his feet firmly on the ground and is an unassuming committed clubman at Parklands. We are lucky to have him. All Parklanders are proud to have such a talented player as a long-time member of our Club, and we celebrate his many successes.
